**Citrus Food Safety Standards Underway**

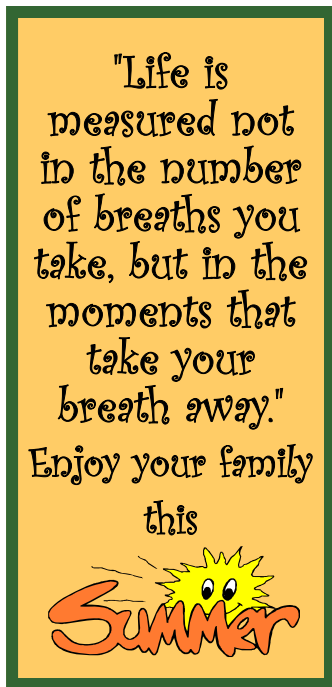
As a part of fresh citrus exports, industry representatives have been considering Good Agricultural Practices (GAPs) for fresh citrus. These practices are a precursor to food safety regulations expected by European trading partners. The fresh GAPs are now being expanded to processed citrus and a draft document has been prepared by UF/IFAS.

An industry committee is being formed to work with IFAS on finalizing the draft document and setting implementation criteria for

the industry. Justin Sorrells and Steve Johnson are PRVCGA's representatives.

Items to be discussed include: Integrated crop management, microbiological contaminants, residue levels, food defense, HACCP, traceability, recall, wildlife management, training and regulatory issues.

At some point, these GAP practices might be used in fruit purchase agreements and/or other supply quality programs.

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**BMPs—More Important Than Ever**



A message communicated loud and clear during Florida Citrus Mutual's Citrus Conference last month was sign up now for Best Management Practices (BMP) or lose a limited time opportunity. The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS) and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) shared the podium with a unified message.

Statewide enrollment in the BMP program hasn't been


what either agency has hoped. Without broad based participation, the program and its benefits for agricultural producers will be lost.

Currently, growers can sign up for the program by completing a Notice of Intent (NOI) notating what BMPs they are currently using and what BMPs they plan to implement. After a period of time, an audit will be completed by the FDACS to assure planned BMPs are actually implemented. The DEP will also be monitoring

local watersheds to see if the BMPs are improving water quality in the area systems. The water quality improvements range from reduced chloride levels to reduced nutrient levels.

PRVCGA's area lost a full time IFAS employee working on BMP implementation. Since then, the effort has floundered. Darren Cole is now stepping in to work in this area and assist with BMP implementation.

## RA Plan Approved

 The Environmental Protection Agency has given formal approval of the Shell Prairie Joshua Creek (SPJC) Reasonable Assurance (RA) Plan and associated performance monitoring reports.

The plan was a regional stakeholder effort to keep the impaired Shell and Prairie Creek water segments under a

Total Maximum Daily Load 4b Category on the Group 3 (Sarasota, Peace, Myakka Basins) Section 303 (d) list. The water quality improvements achieved thus far according to Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) officials are directly related to the SPJC stakeholders support of the plan, and agricultural entities who have partnered with state and/or federal

agencies to improve water quality within these watersheds.

This is a significant milestone, and speaks directly to how critical Stakeholder involvement is. On behalf of our members, PRVCGA would like to thank and recognize Eric DeHaven and Roberta Starks of the SWFWMD for their tireless efforts. They have done a yeoman's job and are to be congratulated!

## PRVCGA Members Vie for Local Office

Three candidates for local County Commission seats are members of PRVCGA. DeSoto citrus grower Brian Burns (D) has qualified for the DeSoto Co. Commission, District 2. Hardee Co. grower Bess Stallings (D) will run for the Hardee Co. Commission, District 2. Associate member, Matt Moyer (D) will also tackle the race for Hardee Co. Commission representing District 4.

It is imperative citizens take their voting privileges seriously by exercising their right to vote and by being informed voters. The primary election is early this year taking place on August 24. July 26, 2010 will be the last day to register for primary voting. General elections will be held November 2, with the registration deadline of October 4.

PAC funds.

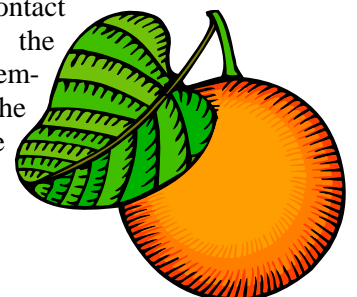

## FDOC Budget Tentatively Approved

The FCC voted to increase disease research funding to the Citrus Research & Development Foundation by \$2.8 million for a total of \$10.8 million, and made no changes to the balance of staff recommendations for funding or program plans.

The revised preliminary budget is \$56.8 million and may require a box tax increase in October. This position mirrors the PRVCGA position, which is based on the hope the crop size will be higher than 147.3 million boxes estimated in the budget.

The Florida Citrus Commission will meet July 21 in Bartow beginning at 9 a.m.



## Nutrient Criteria Moves Forward



An October deadline has been set to adopt inland Numeric Nutrient Criteria. Meanwhile, downstream values are still a moving target sparking many questions of how the two will interact. A two year implementation period has been requested by DEP.

A technical expert Science Advisory Board is being formed by EPA to

review and provide input on the methodologies for coastal, downstream protective values and South Florida flowing waters. This is EPA's reaction to pressure from the Florida Delegation the standards be science based and economically feasible. Nominations are required by July 12.

The questions regarding this process are numerous. Only time will tell how this process unfolds and how onerous

## Pest & Disease Update

### Mediterranean Fruit Fly



In June the Florida Department of Agriculture (FDACS) identified the presence of Mediterranean Fruit Flies in Boca Raton. Since that time, more flies have been detected making this the largest infestation in Florida since the late 1990. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the FADACS cooperatively have launched a sterile fly release program and transferred all necessary resources to the area. At this point, both agencies say the situation is being dealt with appropriately and there is no need for concern from the commercial industry as of yet.

### Citrus Black Spot (CBS)

Eighteen positives have been detected to date, nine from fruit transported into processing plants. Quarantine areas have not yet been established, but will be soon. Tarp regulations are forthcoming.

USDA is working on the CBS regulatory framework to help growers prepare for the fall fruit harvest season. The approach must be based on the most up to date science available. Growers impacted are concerned about their ability to operate under additional regulatory requirements. Trading partners and other fruit producing states will be watching the process closely.

CHRP inspectors have inspected over 35,000 acres of commercial citrus and over 10,000 residential properties. The survey was bias toward the late season orange crop and lemons as well as fruit movement corridors. Fruit graders in the processing plants have been trained to look for CBS symptoms on fruit and found nine incidents of infected fruit. All traced back to known positive blocks.

IFAS has developed outreach publications and posters on CBS identification and control. Research is underway. The diagnostics for CBS

are clear with good morphology, lab and molecular tools and techniques.

There is a growing body of knowledge supporting commercial citrus fruit is not an epidemiologically significant pathway for the spread of CBS. Post harvest latent CBS symptom expression would be highly unlikely from fresh fruit grove blocks where no CBS symptoms had been detected

during the



growing season. This is reminiscent of last year's determination of Citrus Canker infected fruit, which eased fresh shipping regulations.

The industry is awaiting regulatory framework for both fresh and processed fruit from the CBS infected areas. Quarantine areas will be designated requiring tarped loads. Compliance agreements will be used

## Vote NO on Amendment 4



As we approach the general election, it is vitally important Floridians understand the dangers of Amendment 4, and solidify in their minds and the minds of their friends and family a NO Vote. At stake are property rights and future land values.

In 1985, the Florida Legislature passed the Local Government Comprehensive Planning and Land Development Regulation Act commonly referred to as the Growth Management Act. This act requires all local governments to adopt comprehensive land use plans and implement those plans through land development regulations and development orders. The Department of Community Affairs (DCA) is designated as the lead oversight agency, responsible for reviewing comprehensive plans and amendments thereto to determine consistency with State law. Since enactment, all local governments have adopted a comprehensive plan.

The Act also requires local governments to periodically assess their plan and submit an Evaluation and Appraisal Report to DCA. Local governments may adopt amendments to their comprehensive plan no more than twice per year, with some exceptions. Plan amendments fall into the following categories:

- Small-scale amendments—usually 10 acres or less, and are exempt from the twice-per year limitation. There has been an average of 755 adopted small scale amendments annually over the last five years.
- Large scale amendments—Larger than the 10 Acre or less above, reviewed by DCA. According to DCA, they have received an average of 10,050 adopted amendments annually over the last five years.
- Evaluation and Appraisal Reports (EAR) – Every seven years, each local government must submit an EAR to DCA. The EAR-based amendments must be adopted within 18 months after the report is determined to be sufficient.

Currently, local workshops

governments hold to discuss possible proposed amendments with the public. The local government must advertise, hold a local planning hearing, and then re-advertise the plan is being transmitted

### The Ballot Title for Amendment 4 is:

*Referenda Required for Adoption and Amendment of Local Government Comprehensive Land Use Plans*

### Ballot Summary:

*Establishes that before a local government may adopt a new comprehensive land use plan, or amend a comprehensive land use plan, the proposed plan or amendment shall be subject to vote of the electors of the local government by referendum, following preparation by the local planning agency, consideration by the governing body and notice. Provides definitions.*

### Full Text of Amendment:

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF FLORIDA THAT:**

*Article II, Section 7. Natural resources and scenic beauty of the Florida Constitution is amended to add the following subsection:*

*Public participation in local government comprehensive land use planning benefits the conservation and protection of Florida's natural resources and scenic beauty, and the long-term quality of life of Floridians. Therefore, before a local government may adopt a new comprehensive land use plan, or amend a comprehensive land use plan, such proposed plan or plan amendment shall be subject to vote of the electors of the local government by referendum, following preparation by the local planning agency, consideration by the governing body as provided by general law, and notice thereof in a local newspaper of general circulation. Notice and referendum will be as provided by general law. This amendment shall become effective immediately upon approval by the electors of Florida.*

*For purposes of this subsection:*

1. "Local government" means a county or municipality.
2. "Local government comprehensive land use plan" means a plan to guide and control future land development in an area under the jurisdiction of a local government.
3. "Local planning agency" means the agency of a local government that is responsible for the preparation of a comprehensive land use plan and plan amendments after public notice and hearings and for making recommendations to the governing body of the local government regarding the adoption or amendment of a comprehensive land use plan.
4. "Governing body" means the board of county commissioners of a county, the commission or council of a municipality, or the chief elected governing body of a county or municipality, however designated.

to DCA for review. Expansive timeframes for both DCA and local government exist with more public notices published and time for the public to comment before changes are made.

Supporters of Amendment 4 would like the public to think Amendment 4 will magically fix all the woes of development, forcing the local governments to relinquish their decision making process to the public. According to advocates, the public (presumed to be well informed on all things) will make better decisions on land use decisions than professionals trained in dealing with the extremely

complex land use and comprehensive plan issues.

In the end, the process will be expensive for local governments and trample land owner rights. Amendment 4 requires the plan or plan amendment "shall be subject to vote of the electors of the local government." Therefore, every amendment to a county's comprehensive plan would be submitted to all registered voters in the county. The cost for a special election in a medium-sized county would likely range from \$56,000 to \$288,000 per referendum, with the largest county topping out at \$2 million. Every amendment to a city's comprehensive plan would be

submitted to the registered voters in the municipality. The cost for a medium-sized city would likely range from \$2,700 to \$21,000 per referendum, with the largest city topping out at \$330,000. Costs struggling city and county government could ill afford.

It is imperative all land owners work to educate the urban public. Send emails to every friend in your address book asking them to vote "NO" on Amendment 4. and processing plants will be required to properly handle trailer debris.

Movement for fresh fruit will be regulated depending upon the market. Intra and interstate commerce will be subject to certain inspections. Fruit destined for the European Union will be subject to pre-harvest inspection and packinghouse inspections.

Timeframes for these inspections will be forthcoming.

In the meantime, a protective blanket of copper is the currently the best recommendation for protecting your grove.

Participating in the program will currently provide you presumption of compliance with state water quality standards. Enrollees will be provided benefits if water at their location is found to be impaired. This is particularly important as the

Environmental Protection Agency's federal nutrient criteria is set into motion.

Effective July 1, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) will begin issuing 10% **weight tolerance permits**, authorizing the transport of divisible loads up to 88,000 pounds, on designated non-interstate highways. The 10% weight permits may be purchased for \$240 per truck per year at an FDOT permit office; by phone at (850) 410-5777; or on-line at <http://www.fdotmaint.com/Permit>. The maximum truck weight in Florida is still 80,000 pounds. The 10% weight permit is valid only on designated state roads and non-posted County roads, bridges, and does not authorize transport on the Interstate Highway System.
